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Dr. Joseph Majzoub, 2019 HMS William Silen Lifetime Achievement in Mentoring Awardee, Shares His Perspective on Mentoring

Mentoring is an important value at Boston Children's Hospital, and we asked Joseph Majzoub, MD, Thomas Morgan Rotch Professor of Pediatrics in the Division of Endocrinology and recipient of a 2019 William Silen Lifetime Achievement in Mentoring Award, to share with *Perspectives* his thoughts on how to develop effective mentoring relationships with trainees and junior faculty.

Dr. Majzoub notes that most knowledge is part of a continuum and that trainees should be encouraged to contribute to this. Trainees can be daunted by their mentors' accomplishments, forgetting that most careers have modest beginnings. He encourages mentors to "be accessible, not intimidating; reveal yourself and show your vulnerabilities," and to maintain a collegial dialogue with trainees that reflects an authentic exchange of ideas. "Permit/encourage/learn from bilateral flow of thought, especially from mentee to mentor." Providing emotional support in difficult moments is central to the mentoring relationship. "Encourage trainees through their initial stumbles – cheer them on. We all experience adversity, make mistakes as we grow. Help trainees get back on track ... don't avoid difficult discussions and critical, corrective suggestions." Above all, keep the mentee at the forefront of the relationship. "Mentoring is a non-transactional activity. There is no assumed quid pro quo. One should put a mentee's interests ahead of one's own." The mentor's primary role is to be inspiring. The relationship should be joyful, and an investment in the mentee's future.

Office of Faculty Development 2019 Survey Results – What Faculty Told Us

Our sincere thanks to the 365 faculty who responded to the 2019 OFD Survey. Some of the results are summarized here and throughout this issue with more analyses of results and comments ahead. The results will guide us in program planning over the next 2 years, and we are grateful for your many suggestions. We will redouble our efforts to work with Multi Media regarding Zoom archiving. Top choices for workshop topics include: medical education (50%); leadership development (49%); academic promotion (49%); negotiations and conflict management (35%); grant writing and funding (32%); and CV preparation/review (33%). Career conferences and mentoring were an integral part of the survey. 82% had had a career conference in the past 2 years; 57% of faculty reported that the career conference was "helpful" with 34% checking "somewhat helpful." 66% of faculty have mentees; 63% of faculty have a mentor, career advisor, or mentoring network; of those without a mentor, 37% want a mentor. So work to be done! Many faculty work at home to be with family (51%) and to avoid long commutes (49%). Read our articles and announcements from the Medical Library (p.4), the Office of Health Equity and Inclusion (p.5), and OFD work-life programs (p.6) for more survey results. We are pleased that a cross-section of our faculty responded: 63% women, 37% men; 62% clinicians, 30% investigators; 26% Instructors, 43% Assistant Professors, 21% Associate Professors and 9.5% Professors. Half had been a faculty member for 10 years or less and half for more than 10 years. More to come!

Eric Fleegler, MD, Honored as 2019 David S. Weiner Award Recipient

Eric Fleegler, MD, MPH, Assistant Professor of Pediatrics in the BCH Division of Emergency Medicine, was honored with the 2019 David S. Weiner Award for Leadership and Innovation in Child Health on June 3 at a special ceremony held in the Karp 7 Atrium. Dr. Fleegler was recognized for his efforts in creating a unique social service referral system, HelpSteps, that connects patients and their families with social services throughout Massachusetts. The Award will provide \$40,000 to support HelpSteps, an increase of \$10,000 from previous years, to commemorate Boston Children's Hospital's 150th Anniversary.

Sandra Fenwick, MPH, CEO, welcomed the attendees and David S. Weiner, former Boston Children's President and CEO. The annual Weiner Award was established in 1997 to acknowledge BCH staff who developed initiatives in response to community needs. Dr. Elizabeth Woods, Professor of Pediatrics in the BCH Division of Adolescent Medicine, spoke at the ceremony and commended Dr. Fleegler's collaboration with the Boston Public Health Commission's Mayor's Health Line, Mass-211, the United Way and the Greater Boston Food Bank to provide an extensive database of services in Boston and Massachusetts.

Dr. Fleegler, whose dedication to medicine began with an overriding interest in the social determinants of health and a continuing commitment to working with families, social workers, engineers and community organizations, reminded the attendees that "everyone should have equitable access to health, wealth, opportunity and fair treatment." Dr. Fleegler underscored the support of his 2006 Office of Faculty Development Career Development Fellowship, which he received early in his career. 2019 LGBTQ & Friends Celebration

The month of June brings warmth, summer gardens, and energetic LGBTQ celebrations. The 2019 Boston Children's Hospital LGBTQ Pride Celebration was held June 7th in Folkman Auditorium. The 2019 Prism Award, which recognizes exceptional individuals who consistently make a profound difference on behalf of LGBTQ people, honored Allegra Gordon, ScD, MPH, HMS Instructor in Pediatrics in the BCH Division of Adolescent Medicine, whose research has focused on the mental and physical health outcomes of LGBTQ youth who have experienced bullying, and Keiara Moore, Transplant Financial Coordinator, for her efforts as a volunteer at a local Boys and Girls Club in mentoring LGBTQ teens and promoting a safe environment for them.

Sandra Fenwick, MPH, Chief Executive Officer, opened the event by recognizing Boston Children's Hospital's legacy of compassionate care for all children and how "we will continue to make it better." Elizabeth Boskey, PhD, MPH, LICSW, Social Worker and Research Fellow in the BCH Center for Gender Surgery, discussed how the Center has built a diverse network of support for patients. The event's keynote speaker, Alex Keuroghlian, MD, MPH, HMS Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Director of Education and Training Programs at The Fenway Institute, outlined best practices in how clinicians, researchers, and administrative staff can communicate with patients to heighten LGBTQ visibility in health settings and research. Dr. Keuroghlian advised that staff avoid relying on assumptions and to provide intake forms for patients that indicate preferred pronouns. In meeting patients, clinicians need to consider that gender identity, sexual orientation, and sexual history can be included in a medical appointment. The June 2019 Office of Faculty Development faculty survey revealed that 54% of respondents knew about the Longwood Center library and 41% have visited it. News from the BCH Archives by Alina Morris, MLIS

This summer, the Archives Program is looking back at the treatment and care of polio patients at Boston Children’s Hospital with a pop-up exhibit on polio in the Patient Entertainment Center on July 22. Below we highlight the Mary MacArthur Respirator Unit that treated Boston Children’s polio patients from 1950-1958.

Shortly after Boston Children’s Hospital was founded in 1869, an independent organization of women called the Ladies’ Aid Association formed to support the hospital and donate much needed supplies. As the hospital grew the need for non-acute, long-term care for its patients increased. In response, the Ladies’ Aid Association established a convalescent home in Wellesley. The convalescent home’s open air shacks and sun porches made it a destination for young tuberculosis patients. But as antibiotics became increasingly available in the 1940s, the Convalescent Home began to seek uses other than general convalescent care for its facilities. In 1950, the Convalescent Home opened the Mary MacArthur Respirator Unit for patients with poliomyelitis. The unit was a memorial to the late Mary MacArthur, the 19-year-old daughter of actress Helen Hayes and Charles MacArthur, who died of polio in 1949. Helen Hayes, affectionately known as the First Lady of American Theater, was a renowned actress, one of fifteen to receive all four of the prestigious entertainment awards (a Tony, Emmy, Grammy and Oscar). When her daughter, Mary, lost her young life to polio, Helen founded the Mary MacArthur Fund, which opened the Mary MacArthur Respirator Unit in collaboration with the March of Dimes, to treat victims of polio. Thanks to the efforts of John Enders, PhD, and others to eradicate the disease, the need for a respirator unit began to fade. The Convalescent Home closed in 1958 and its property sold to Babson Institute, now Babson College.

Dabney, MD, MHCDS, Chief Medical Officer for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and Associate Division Chief, Cerebral Palsy Program at Nemours/Alfred I. DuPont Hospital for Children. Dr. Dabney's lecture, "Healthcare Disparities, Can We Really Afford Not to Address Them" reviewed the adverse financial impact of healthcare disparities.

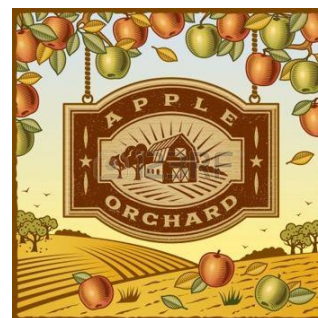
