

How to Get Birth Control

Birth Control Guide for People With CF

The Affordable Care Act mandates that insurance companies must cover FDA-approved birth control methods prescribed by an in-network doctor at 100%. This means no out-of-pocket cost even if you have not met your deductible yet. Only a very small number of religious employers are exempt from this rule. If you do not have insurance or do not want to go through your insurance to access birth control, many places offer free or low-cost birth control.

You may need to see a provider in person for certain types of birth control like IUDs, the implant, diaphragms, or the shot. You can get a prescription for other types like pills, patches, or rings through an in-person or telehealth visit. Some telehealth services will also ship birth control to your home.
