

Barrier Methods: The Sponge

Birth Control Guide for People With CF

BIRTH CONTROL SPONGE (ALSO KNOWN AS THE SPONGE)

The sponge is a small, round, sponge-like device. You place it deep in the vagina before sex. It creates a barrier so sperm cannot get through the cervix. It does not prevent STIs.¹

The sponge has spermicide. You do not need to apply extra spermicide before inserting. It is OK to use water or silicone-based lubricants with the sponge. The sponge does not have latex. It is safe to use if you have a latex allergy. Some people may be sensitive to the spermicide in the sponge. If you or your partner notice any irritation, you may need to try a different product.

You should not use a sponge while you are on your period. This can increase your risk of toxic shock syndrome.²

You do not need a prescription for the sponge. You can buy them online.

Today® Sponge

- Wet with water before inserting to "activate" the spermicide.
- Insert up to 24 hours before having sex. Do not leave in for longer than 30 hours.
- You can have sex multiple times without changing out the sponge or using more spermicide within 30 hours.
- Wait at least 6 hours after sex to remove.
- It is safe to use with a condom to protect from STIs.

SAFE-TTM

- It contains a spermicide gel. You do not need to get it wet before inserting.
- Insert up to 6 hours before sex. Do not leave in for more than 12 hours.
- You can have sex multiples times without changing out the sponge or using more spermicide within 12 hours.
- It is safe to use with a condom to protect from STIs.
